MINISTER'S REPORT

As your Teaching Elder and Pastor, I have found these past two years to be extremely disorienting in terms of ministry practice. Just as I felt, after two years, I was starting to get a feel for the patterns and flow of ministry here in Edenderry, everything was turned on its head. The normal activities including regular home, Nursing Home and Hospital pastoral visitation was stopped and remains severely curtailed. Visits to hospital, which would have been usually at least three times a week, has become three times in a year and only to spend limited time with those who are dying.

Preaching was to my mobile phone in my study, up-loaded to the internet. All face-to-face meetings were cancelled and zoom became our best friend. It has been a strange time.

Like you I'm grateful for the return to what is close to normality. I am encouraged to see that slowly but surely members are returning to services of worship. It should be noted that, unlike most other congregations, we have got the majority of our younger families back and one or two extra joining with us each Sunday.

In saying a few words of thanks, I want to restrict myself to the Pastoral Team and what happens around Sunday services.

It's been a delight to have Trevor working alongside me, always willing to undertake any task asked of him. The only problem being that his very effective preaching and teaching has been recognised throughout the denomination and a queue is already forming seeking to encourage him to consider filling their vacancies when he becomes eligible to on 1st July. As a Congregation we must uphold Trevor, Suzanne and the family in our prayers as they enter into this exciting process.

Kirsty-Lee has adapted her role over the past year to take on some pastoral responsibilities and has been very acceptable in the calls she has made, and the support given.

Sincere thanks must be offered to Andrew for the work he does in leading musicians, vocalists and choir. We are blessed to have so many people who are both gifted and willing to use their abilities to the glory of God in leading our praise. Thanks to everyone who leads in this way. And also, to those who look after sound, recording, streaming and PowerPoint – again this faithful band work away quietly, their work often only ever recognised when something goes wrong!

Thanks to those who welcome and steward, to those who prepare and serve tea and coffee. Thanks also to those who help out with creche and lead in Click, and Youth Bible Class. Each Sunday a small army of people busy themselves making our congregational life run smoothly. And this is replicated each day of the week as our buildings have returned to the busy schedule of meetings and activities. As a congregation we have much to be thankful for.

Special thanks must go to Clifford Clyde, Sam Preston and Nigel McClelland whose time and expertise over many years have driven this project. It was a great delight to welcome the moderator, Rt Rev Dr David Bruce to join us in celebration of the opening of our refurbished church building, new rooms and coffee area.

In the middle of much thanksgiving, it is also essential that we recognise that for many families 2021 also brought great challenge and loss. Over the course of the next year plans have been made to give thanks for 200 years of ministry here and we also pray that the events in place to mark this anniversary will be a wonderful opportunity to point many towards our Saviour.

The Lord has also provided this year with the encouragement of a number of new members joining us as well as with many members having a renewed desire to share their faith and have a positive impact in many ways in our community. A good number of the congregation took part in an evangelism course entitled Living and Telling and others benefitted from an online outreach course lead by Avisai and Jude Suarez which focused on outreach to people in our community from a different faith background. It has also been a pleasure to host the Food Bank from our new premises with our own members getting actively involved in this essential work.

The new year will bring new opportunities to advance the gospel and we ask that as a congregation you would pray for Robert Dowey and Brian McGuire as they take on their new roles as Session Clerk and Deputy Clerk.

CONGREGATIONAL COMMITTEE

2020 will certainly not be remembered as a normal year and 2021 did not significantly improve. It would be a year where sadness was remembered and where staying at home was still the only option for many.

The Congregational Committee commenced business late. The first meeting of the year would normally be held in February, but we commenced in March and due to restrictions, we also held it over Zoom.

The principal focus was the scheduled completion of the Meeting House refurbishment. This completion was successfully met on the 7th May 2021 and we recommenced worship, in the building, on the 16th May. The building was officially opened by the Moderator Rt. Rev. Dr. David Bruce on the 27th November 2021. It is with gratitude we thank all the professionals involved in the safe and successful completion of the refurbishment; Architects Knox and Markwell and Leo Matheson Ltd (principal contractor). I personally

would like to thank Mr Sam Preston and Mr Clifford Clyde for their professional judgement and guidance throughout the project and also all those who gave of their time to assist on the Refurbishment Subcommittee. We have gained a modern, bright, flexible space that is able to provide for the future vision and demands of our fellowship. God has blessed us.

As we gained access to our Meeting House, other national restrictions began to ease. Our services of worship became less restrictive, and organisations were able to recommence at a level, which by the end of the year had almost returned to normal.

As in the previous year our deepest gratitude is owed to the Tech Team. They were able to transfer all their equipment from the Main Hall to the Meeting House within a few days. Streaming of Sunday services and Midweeks are now fully part of our ministry.

Normal committee business continued with one overriding issue coming to the fore, the increasing cost of energy. Endeavouring to minimise the financial impact of the increase in gas prices the committee decided to reduce room temperatures and to minimise space heating. It was hoped that the reduction in space heating would not significantly impact the activities of our church. The Estate Management Subcommittee, led by Mr George Proctor and Mr John Murdock, commenced an energy review, and would report in early 2022.

As we entered 2022, COVID-19 restrictions were greatly eased and normality gradually returned. Energy prices were on the rise and would be most likely continue. Despite the challenges, we look back on 2021 and see the work of a faithful God. We read what His Word says about our future and where our trust should be. In Matthew Ch. 6, verse 33, Seek the Kingdom of God above all else, and live righteously, and He will give you everything you need.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2021

The church accounts for the year ended 31 December 2021 are available to view on the website of the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland. To find them, you should click on www.charitycommissionni.org.uk and type "First Portadown" in the charity search box. These accounts are prepared in the format required by law and many people have commented that they are far from user-friendly. Unfortunately, we are not permitted to present accounts in any other format.

In this report, I will try to point out the main features of our 2021 accounts.

We have four main funds, which are maintained separately:

- General Fund (Freewill Offering)
- Property Fund
- Missionary Fund
- United Appeal Fund.

I will start with some encouraging news.

Total givings across these funds amounted to £445,730 in 2021. That compares to

£271,618 ten years ago. This ten-year increase is significantly better than inflation and should be an encouragement to all of us.

Looking at the individual funds, however, shows that that Freewill Offering has been stuck, for some time, at just below £170,000 per year and is not showing any growth at all. The Missionary Fund is pretty steady. As you might expect, the main increase is our Property Fund, as members have made generous contributions to assist with our rebuilding project.

The figures, therefore, also present a challenge to the members of our Congregational Committee.

As we continue to promote the support our Property Fund, to allow payment of all remaining costs and then hopefully a slightly accelerated repayment of our loan from Bank of Ireland, let us operate our general finances prudently, so that within four years or so, we can encourage our faithful members to re-direct their Property Fund givings back to Freewill Offering.

So, as we give thanks for 200 years of Freewill Offering, let us plot a path towards Freewill Offering income of £200,000 per year, before the middle of this decade.

General Fund (Freewill Offering)

I will attempt to guide you through the main features of our General Fund in 2021:

- We started the year with £76,162 in the bank.
- We took in freewill offering at £165,743, down by 2.1% on 2020.
- Sunday loose collections were only £2,489, for obvious reasons. In 2008, they
 were almost £16,000.
- Gift Aid tax refunds were £27.665.
- Collections for others amounted to £1,604 as the congregation responded to fundraising for the Booth family (£530), the Earl Haig Poppy Fund on Remembrance Sunday (£225), the Students' Bursary Fund (£409) and Tearfund at Christmas (£440).
- Salaries and allowances were £99,597, with a reduced staff headcount and furlough scheme support from HM Treasury.
- Assessments to Church House and the Presbytery of Armagh were £30,834;
- Our repairs costs were down slightly at £8,308.
- Our energy costs were very high at £24,448, with £16,932 of that being on gas;
- general running costs were quite low, as the pandemic halted so many of our activities.
- Our bank balance at 31 December 2021 was £94,555.

Property Fund

We had a good year on the property fund with regular income of £208,346. We also had Gift Aid refunds of £40,733 and donations of £19,909. We spent £747,374, leaving us with a balance of *minus* £300,881 at the end of December. (The balance on the loan account was £377,577, but there was a credit on

our current account.)

The advance on the Bank of Ireland loan was £420,000. The first of the 84 monthly repayments of £5,567.02 started in April 2021, so the final repayment is projected to fall due in March 2028.

The interest charged is about £3,000 per quarter, but this will go up, as interest rates are now rising.

We can make additional repayments without penalty at any time, but amounts overpaid cannot be re-borrowed.

We expect to pay the contract retention in May 2022 and at that point we will consider if we are able to start making additional payments against the loan balance.

Missionary Fund

There is a separate report from the treasurer of the Missionary Fund.

United Appeal Fund

United Appeal collections, including Gift Aid tax refunds, totalled £21,493, which covered the Target of Honour set by the Presbytery of Armagh.

Regulatory and compliance matters

The church accounts have been audited by Ruddell & Co and were approved at separate meetings of the congregation and of Kirk Session. They were then filed with the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland.

All returns required by HMRC, Bank of Ireland and the Presbytery of Armagh are up to date.

TREASURER'S REPORT - MISSIONARY COMMITTEE

On behalf of the Missionary Committee, I would like to thank all who contributed towards the support of our six missionary families during 2021. Families who are supported, as sent by our fellowship are: Henry Bell, Luke & Karis Carson, Robert & Kyla Cuthbert, John & Sarah Kennedy, Jonathan & Nicola McCracken, and Avisai & Judith Suarez. Through the Missionary Fund we endeavour to meet our families' basic costs and your contributions go in full towards meeting this need.

Giving during 2021 was slightly increased over 2020 (0.9%) and £69 343 was distributed. Methods of giving have changed with many more donating by direct debitthis was due to the impact of Covid-19 when the trend was changed at the beginning of 2020. The efforts by many to ensure support continued is very much appreciated. Last year the average number of monthly envelopes was 46, while the average number of direct debits was 49.

Direct giving has been enhanced in a number of ways. Gift Aid amounting to £11 545

was claimed. If you are a taxpayer and wish to have an extra 25% claimed from HMRC on your behalf, please ask for a Gift Aid form. Alternatively, if you are no longer a taxpayer, please let me know. Other income also includes dividends from invested bequests. In 2021 we received £4456. Another much appreciated source is the midweek meetings yielding £253.

The Missionary Committee also administers the Discretionary Fund. This is funded by annual ground rents, but we also received a generous legacy from the estate of the Late Mrs E Robinson. From this fund we distributed £2500 by way of Grants of Encouragement and grants to other Mission Agencies.

Thank you to all who give to and pray for our Missionary Families.

CLICK

The year of 2020 – 2021 was a turbulent time for CLICK with COVID 19 restrictions preventing us from holding in person meetings even when church worship began in person in limited forms. There is still a great need in Portadown with many having no time for God and unknowingly heading for a lost eternity.

Please pray for wisdom for the future for how best we can serve God in Portadown.

The key to the continuity and operation of the Shop is Sarah McKibbin and without her input and commitment it is doubtful if the Shop could operate.

The Trustees are indebted to these volunteers for the time given and are genuinely thankful for their input, which ensures the Shop operates.

Kids Club OTT (Ordinary Totally Transformed)

The work of Kids Club in the Garvaghy Road area had largely been put on hold since mid-March 2020 due to the corona virus pandemic. In June this year the committee met to discuss the future of Kids Club. At this stage Hazel Irwin stepped down from her role as leader in charge. Hazel started working for Edenderry Ministries on a two-year contract in 2016. This job initially got her involved with the work of Kids Club, however she continued to serve faithfully within the ministry for a further three years. Hazel helped the team through many challenges and changes and we would like to thank her wholeheartedly for giving so much to this work. At this meeting Judith Buchanan and Anna Acheson set an aim to start Kids Club up again by October.

By September, a group of over 10 faithful Christians were gathered together to be leaders at Kids Club. However other issues arose and the start date was pushed back to December.

Between August and November child protection and Covid safety measures were put in place with the help of Robert Dowey and George Russell on behalf of Edenderry Ministries. We would like to thank them for the essential help they provided at this time and the work they continue to do with us. In November the work of Kids Club was also publicised by posting leaflets through letterboxes, putting posters up in the local community and using the Kids Club OTT Facebook page.

Although Kids Club had taken place regularly on a Friday night for over 15 years, this was no longer possible. Therefore Kids Club started back on Wednesday 1st December in the Ashgrove Community Centre with 11 children attending. Altogether by the end of 2021, there were around 25-30 children registered at Kids Club with 11-16 attending weekly. We were extremely grateful to see some familiar faces and also to welcome new children in.

Throughout December we used CEF resources to learn about the Christmas story together. We learnt a memory verse (1 John 4 v 14) and a song (One Way - Hillsong), discussed the story in small groups, played games and completed crafts. At our final Kids Club in December, we were able to give each child a "blessing bag" which had been donated by Portadown Emmanuel. These contained a box of sweets, crisps, biscuits and a CEF calendar.

We are grateful for the continual prayers and support from Edenderry Presbyterian

Church. Please pray that the leaders would be encouraged in this work and that children would continue to come to Kids Club and would come to accept the Gospel message.


A special thanks to Andrew for his faithful service leading the worship team and choir; we are blessed to have such faithful musical servants in our congregation.

Stewardship and Finance

Generosity encouraged

The church teaches its members to look to the Bible for advice about giving. God promises that those who give generously and cheerfully are not only a blessing to others but are richly blessed themselves.

"Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work."

2 Corinthians 9: 7-8

The Code of our Presbyterian Church in Ireland refers to "contributions by the people, in a spirit of generous and responsible stewardship for the work of the church."

The work of our church is almost entirely supported by giving from our congregation. It is a great help if our members contribute regularly, using one of our envelope schemes.

What to give to?

Weekly **Freewill Offering** (F.W.O.) supports our general fund, which finances the day-to-day work of our church, including stipend, other staff costs, our heat, light and insurances and all our other running costs. This also funds the assessments that are levied by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland.

Our **Property Fund** is for the maintenance of our meeting house, our church halls and the manse. It is used primarily for major projects.

The **Missionary Fund** supports the missionary families connected with our church, working at home and abroad, and also passes on gifts received for the benefit of other missionary workers. Monthly envelopes are available and these allow contributors to nominate a beneficiary. If not stated, allocation is carried out by our Missionary Committee.

How to give

Weekly envelopes are available for Freewill Offering and Property Fund. Monthly envelopes are available for Missionary Fund. Alternatively, you may prefer to contribute by monthly standing order from your bank or building society. Simply ask the treasurer for a form.

A gift to the church in your will

The work of the church has been greatly assisted by many generous gifts in the wills of members. You can see the enduring value of such gifts in the Bequest pages, later in this report. A gift to the church in your will is exempt from Inheritance Tax.

The Old Age Fund and The Presbyterian Women's Fund

The General Assembly seeks to provide a ministry among older members.

The object of the **Old Age Fund** and the **Presbyterian Women's Fund** is to help aged or infirm members of our church. Financial support may be provided in the form of a quarterly grant, or a one-off grant in special circumstances.

Applicants who meet **some** of the following criteria may be eligible:

- living at home
- income less than £12,000 per annum
- in receipt of Income Support, Attendance Allowance or Pension Credit
- savings less than £16,000
- under the pastoral care of a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland
- not receiving significant financial assistance from other family members
- having medical needs that require extra expenditure.

Please speak to our Minister if you would like to make an application.

GIFT AID

Gift Aid is a Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs scheme that is of great benefit to our church.

How Gift Aid works

The church can claim back the basic rate tax already paid on money received from individuals who have paid UK income tax or capital gains tax. No minimum contribution is required, you can cancel at any time and tax can even be recovered retrospectively.

All that is required is that the donor must pay tax at least equal to the amount of tax being reclaimed and must give their offering through one of our envelope schemes

Example

Basic rate income tax is 20%. If you give £8 to the church, this is treated as a gift made net of basic rate tax. The gross amount is £10 and so the church is able to reclaim the £2 tax.
